THE PREVIEW

The long awaited return of David Pocock, along with watching the Crusaders limping off the plane at Perth airport, will have buoyed the Force in the lead up to the game. The Crusaders meanwhile are not so fortunate with injured players. No less than five All Blacks have been left out of the side in Brad Thorn, Sam Whitelock, Kieran Read, Andy Ellis and Daniel Carter. The loss of the former three is devastating for the Crusaders line-out, while Carter and Ellis' absence forces Blackadder to persist with a halves pairing that didn't cut the mustard against the Highlanders last weekend.

Despite their injuries, the Crusaders are still a danger team right across the park and this undoubtedly starts with their front row. The undisputed form pigs in the competition have troubled better front rows than the Force's. Pek Cowan, Nathan Charles and Matt Dunning will have their work cut out for them coming against an All Black front row of Wyatt Crocket, Corey Flynn and Ben Franks. Havong a prop of the calibre of Owen Franks on the bench is means there will be no respite.

The Force will, find some reprieve in the line-outs where Nathan Sharpe and Sam Wykes continue their excellent partnership.
